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Temple Beth El Cantor Message

The Torah sets three major festivals for us to observe: Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. All three are presented as times when we are obligated to assemble and to celebrate. In the times of the Temple in Jerusalem, one was expected to go there to make one's holiday offerings.

These are different times. Many people still observe Passover and Sukkot. Shavuot, however, seems to be the least of the three. Why would that be? Given that Shavuot is the remembrance of receiving the Torah at Sinai, you would think that it would be of greater importance, even primacy. I suspect that it may have to do with the fact that Passover and Sukkot entail very specific rituals, and Shavuot does not. Well, actually, it does, but no one seems to do them anymore. More about that in a bit.

On Passover we have the cleaning, the preparations, the buying and preparing of special foods, and the whole no chametz thing. On Sukkot, we have the lulay and the etrog, and the sukkah itself which we are to dwell in for the week (weather permitting). The only practices tied to Shavuot are the eating of dairy and pulling an all-nighter studying Torah. While eating dairy isn't a real inconvenience (who doesn't like blintzes, cheesecake and ice cream?), neither is it something so special that it is specifically associated with a particular holiday. As for staying up all night, I dare say that it is something most of us have not done in a long time for any reason.

The three pilgrimage festivals reflect the high points of the year in an agrarian community: planting, first-fruits and harvest. This would hold across different cultures. Part of the genius of Judaism is to infuse that which is regular, even pedestrian, with an opportunity for *kavanah*, for intent. When we are mindful of our activities, we increase the incidence of holiness. This is why we refer to the festivals

as the times of freedom, giving of the Torah, and rejoicing.

It might be argued that, as a Cantor, I have an inherent bias in favor of ritual. My personal commitment to the importance of ritual observance predated my time in the cantorate, and will likely continue afterward.

From time to time, I am asked why the emphasis on ritual. Can't we be good Jews simply by living ethical lives and doing acts of *tikkun olam*? I think that Shavuot serves as an example that the answer to that questions is no. Were we to live such a life, we would still be good people, but we would not be living a life that was identifiably Jewish. In the absence of ritual, there is an absence of observance and engagement. Perhaps the lesson of Shavuot is that it is not enough to receive the Torah. We must also practice it.

On April 7th, 2021 an amazing group of people came together at The House of Israel Cemetery on Mason Road in Utica, NY; to pay their last respects to a complete stranger, a gentleman who had no family to honor him, say goodbye or pray for him.

It all began when we received a call funeral from director from Hackensack, NJ asking if there was any way Joseph Paul Zelliff could be buried near his mother in the House of Israel Cemetery, they had some documentation about his mother and her untimely death (by drowning in a pool in Rome, NY in 1972). They had a copy of his birth certificate and an old census report. From that small amount of information his mother's grave was located and he was able to be buried next to her.

The funeral director Sherry Ben Simon who drove Joseph from New Jersey to New York didn't expect anyone to be there for the internment. She was both extremely shocked and pleasantly surprised by the number of people who came to say goodbye and honor Joseph.

Our Cantor Kalman Socolof spoke about a man he didn't know except from the few small details on the documents we received, but showed that Joseph did matter. It appeared Joseph had a difficult life and absolutely no family at all. What a wonderful way to spend an hour out of our life in this awful time of Covid-19 and this dreadful Pandemic.

We need to recognize these people who gave of themselves for Joseph, it was a remarkable tribute to them. Thank you so much for being part of celebrating Joseph's life and having a minyan for him.
