Rabbi's Message

Rabbi Gustavo Geier

I just listened to the February 19th podcast by Joel Chasnoff. I don't know if you remember him as the comedian and author, we had the pleasure of hosting for a fun evening with dinner included at the JCC.

I usually enjoy his podcasts, and I rarely disagree with the concepts he shares in them. But this week, I agree so much that I can't help but share with those who don't always listen the impression it left with me.

Joel made a sharp critique of American Judaism, based on the months he spent touring with his show among communities not just from Conservative or Reform movements, but also Reconstructionist and Orthodox communities across North America.

In short, I'd say he wasn't too optimistic about the future of the liberal Jewish religious movements and his vision was as clear as the one I've been feeling in recent years. Conservative and Reform Jews, for the most part, suffer from the exile of their young members, which is hardly news to any of us. But above all, there is a lack of commitment—not just to our traditions and mitzvot (always speaking from a progressive or liberal perspective)—but also to a significant rift with the State of Israel, which for many years was the central axis of global Jewish identity.

It's true that we can be proud of our national identity, in this case, American. It's true that every country has its own imprint regarding customs and views on Judaism. But the importance of traditions, Torah, mitzvot, and Israel was always present among our ancestors. They were the axis and guide in every event, policy, fundraiser, and educational vision from time immemorial.

In my opinion, that's what kept our people strong in values, unity, and perseverance throughout time.

As a rabbinic student for many (many) years, I often questioned what the real role of a rabbi should be. To teach Torah? To lead prayer?

To bring people closer to the mitzvot? To explain them so they happen more consciously, with a firmer will? And Israel? Should it be present?

It's all the above and much more.

It's the responsibility of the congregants to ensure that all this happens and gets passed down, not just by the rabbi on duty but from parents to children, and to grandchildren. It won't work if we make the commitment something lax and insignificant. It won't work if we view our history, our traditions, and our Jewish law as obsolete simply because we don't know it or look at it from a distance with prejudice.

I don't think the Jewish people have much of a future without the Land of Israel. Controversial, but true. I believe that without the Land of Israel, over time, the diaspora will shrink to an association that's increasingly diluted in our past; even more so than it is today.

I think Israel continues to offer a place of not just belonging but of rooting; the place of origin to which one can always return—even if they never do—but if it weren't there, they would feel an emptiness, even from afar.

This is not considering the millions of Jews, brothers, and sisters, who consider it their only nation and homeland, for which many have died defending it.

Joel Chasnoff referenced an article published in the Times, signed by many people, rabbis, and cantors, condemning the alleged "cleansing" carried out by the IDF and the possibility of moving forward with the almost crazy (in my opinion) Trump plan to relocate all Gazans.

Joel referenced the thousands and thousands of dollars that ad in the New York Times cost, and how that money was never invested in any kind of faint appeal for the lives torn apart, kidnapped, tortured, and ruined since October 7, 2023.

I don't think I've seen the same level of public initiative or outcry with such an enormous expenditure, showing indignation over Israel's sovereignty being violated in October 2023, nor for the men and women who were violated, stripped of their lives, their freedom, even after more than 500 days. I haven't seen a similar page published condemning the barbaric slaughter of babies and elderly people, or the annihilation of entire innocent families.

I understand that a rabbi should have a special commitment to those who are weak. The last 500 days have shown that Hamas and much of the population of Gaza are not the weak ones. The support from the Red Cross and UN-led organizations not only gave them power and impunity but also left the trust in the concept of supposed neutrality at a level almost equivalent to fraud.

Commitment to Israel—not to its governments and politicians, but to the State of Israel—is, in my view, inherent to rabbinical formation, the rabbinic task, and community work. As we always say, Israel needs us, but we need Israel more. And it's our job to sustain it in the best way we can and to educate those who follow us in that commitment.

It's time to sit down and talk about how we can do this together. It's time to think about how we can smooth over our differences and strengthen ourselves in a project that doesn't just secure the survival of our congregations for a few years, but looks ahead to the next 10 or perhaps 20 years, so that our grandchildren won't have to rack their brains thinking about how to survive, but will simply continue the legacy passed down to them by their parents and grandparents... as used to happen with our people in time immemorial.

We are again very close to Purim, the perfect time to put on masks for a day, only to take them off the next day and show ourselves as we truly are, bringing out the best in us to grow together... as a community.



It's that time of year again to start thinking about having your loved ones' headstones and footstones cleaned. BUT FIRST A LITTLE STORY

Last fall my brother went to our parents' graves in Massachusetts, he called me later that day and told me he tried to clean them up a little, but they were pretty dirty. We discussed it and decided to find someone to clean them, and we would split the cost.

He contacted the person in charge of the cemetery and was given the name of the person to call to clean the stones.

He called the stone cleaner and asked them to clean the 2 stones and asked for the price. WELL did he get a big surprise. The price quoted was \$500.00 for 2 ordinary headstones. We didn't even ask about the 2 footstones because my brother had cleaned them with a wire brush, and they look really nice.

We talked about it and decided we would have them cleaned since we had never had them done before, "SHAME ON US".




